

Frequently Asked Questions About Coaching



Who are the coaches in AYSO?

- Dads, Moms, Uncles, Aunts, Grandpa, Grandma, older brothers, older sisters.
- Anyone 18 years of age or older who has the desire to help children learn how to play soccer through positive coaching in a safe, fun, and fair environment.

I don't know anything about soccer, I've never played the game, and I have not even watched a single soccer game on TV.

- We will provide you with coaching clinics and classes prior to the start of the season. You will also be given an easy to follow manual with simple instructions and an explanation of AYSO philosophies and regulations.
- *Knowing the game comes second to your desire to help the kids and to be part of AYSO.*

What do I do now?

- Don't Panic
- Please register as a AYSO volunteer with the Region CVPA (**No volunteer form, no coaching**)
- Be prepared to attend coaching classes if not certified to your current division level. Classes will be held in the June-July time frame. The AYSO Regional Coaching staff will contact you if your certification needs to be upgraded.
- Go online to www.aysotraining.org and take the Safe Haven Training. This is not necessary every year. The AYSO Regional Coaching staff will contact you with your AYSO ID and inform you if Safe Haven training is needed.
- Attend the Coach Orientation in early August. Divisional coordinators will contact all selected coaches and provide dates.

Important Coaching Info

- Thank you for Volunteering
- Applying to coach does NOT guarantee you will be assigned a team
- Coaches must be at least 18 years old
- Only the head coach's child(ren) will be guaranteed placement on his/her team

Always remember you can call the coach administrator, referee administrator, safety director, or your division coordinators for support and advice. We are all part of a team; we're here to help one another for the benefit of the kids.
